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Reviews

Academic

[Princeton] The majority of classes are single-sex classes until the junior year. Language and elective classes are always co-ed, but non-AP freshman English, science, math, and history classes are single-sex. For upper level classes, the workload can sometimes be 4-6 hours of work for one day. Average class size is about 10 students. 17 is the maximum number of students. Freshmen have required Study Hall and boarding students have quiet study hours at night. Webb Schools use a rotating schedule for classes, and every student is required to have a "free period." The teachers are very accessible. A lot of the teachers live on campus. Even though teachers are required available for "Extra Help" hours, usually they will go above and beyond to help their students do better.

[Harvard] All freshman are required to ride and take care of a horse for their freshman year, and all new upperclassmen students are required to ride for one term. All students are also required to go camping twice a year for 5 days at a time—once at the beginning of the school year, and then again in the fall. Most trips are backpacking trips but there are also horse trips and kayaking trips and even possibly cycling trips. All students are required to go on at least one backpacking trip and horse trip their freshman year. Every student is required to do an afternoon activity which can be sports, horse-back riding, rock-climbing, or an independent project approved by the school. Each student is required to play on a sports team at least one term.

College Counseling

[Princeton] Webb School has one college guidance counselor. His name is Mr. Martinez. He is a very friendly, very honest, very busy man. He is very well connected to a lot of great schools. Freshman and sophomore year, he gives general tips on college topics. Meet one-on-one in junior year. He gives each senior his personal cell number in case of college admissions emergencies (they do happen).

[Harvard] Because of the small number of students at Webb, every student gets a personalized experience with the college guidance office. Regular meetings with the college guidance counselor start in the junior year and involve both the students and parents.

Admissions Process

[Princeton] Interview is required. Two or three "feeder-schools" for Webb: Foothill and Oak Tree Schools.

[Harvard] The SSAT or the ISEE required. An interview is required. Phone interviews might be conducted for those who are overseas and unable to travel. The questions are basic ones about school, what you like about it, what you like to do, etc. It is a conversation so they can get to know you. Parents should be involved and enthusiastic about the process. Not overbearing, but involved. Foothill Country Day and St. Marks are both somewhat "feeder schools."

Extra-Curricular Activities

[Princeton] Webb sports are not very good. Sometimes there are even not enough people to make both a Varsity and a JV team. But the teams emphasize personal improvement and encourage people of all shapes and sizes to do their best. Instead of PE, a student is required to play one sport each year. The coaches are their teachers during the day.

[Harvard] At Webb they encourage students to take advantage of the opportunities on campus and to be well-rounded students upon graduation. Clubs and sports are available.

Quality of School Life

[Princeton] Campus is two minutes away from the Claremont Colleges. It is a very nice town. Webb is very diverse. There are a lot of international students: students from Korea, South Africa, New Zealand, Uzbekistan, Slovenia, Russia, Mexico, Argentina, Saudi Arabia, Taiwan, and more. The student body is mostly middle class and upper middle class. There is a great selection of food in the dining halls. \ It's set up a lot like a college cafeteria. Between periods, students can stop in the dining hall and get snacks (fresh fruits and PB&J sandwiches) and cold water. Twice a week, the school has "formal dinner" for boarding students, where all students but the seniors are required to wear their uniforms.

[Harvard] The campus is beautiful. 77-acres of nature and school buildings, including faculty houses and dormitories. The dorms are pretty nice and definitely have rooms bigger than most colleges. Usually have one roommate until you get a single your senior year. The city of Claremont is not only beautiful, but incredibly safe. There are Webb Vans that will take students to the local shopping malls, movie theaters, amusements parks, beaches, etc.
